- Email question from a member: How does BC Archery propose to become more relevant to the average new archer? What ideas does BC Archery to increase engagement overall in the sport?
- Stu Murray: Since 2019 we've been forced to hold back because of COVID-19, but we haven't been idle. We've planned a TOP Clinic in Prince George, we've developed a new triple crown award for archers, a recognition program, a para

archery program and purchased new bows. We are working with Canadian Women & Sport to develop a girls program; we've encouraged "try it" programs with our clubs for Archery Day on September 17<sup>th</sup>; we've changed the host manual to be more inviting for clubs that can't afford to put the money up front for championships; we've changed the JOP manual to improve how we award certificates; we've hosted provincials but have seen a drop in membership; we've developed a risk management matrix, available on our website; and David Sandquist is working on a manual on how to start archery clubs.

#### INDEPENDENT PRACTITIONER'S REVIEW ENGAGEMENT REPORT

To the Board of Directors British Columbia Archery Association

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of British Columbia Archery Association that comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2023, and the statements of operations and changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, as well as a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements based on our review. We conducted our review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require us to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

#### Conclusion

Based on our review, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of British Columbia Archery Association as at March 31, 2023 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

#### PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The British Columbia Archery Association was formed to perpetuate, foster, and manage the practice of archery and without limiting the generality of the foregoing; to adopt, interpret, and enforce rules for the practice of archery in all its forms; to hold annual tournaments for the purpose of determining the Champions for the British Columbia Archery Association; and to act in general as the supreme governing body in all matters that pertain to archery in the Province of British Columbia, Canada. The Association is registered under the Society Act of British Columbia and is not subject to income tax. The Association is not a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and therefore cannot issue charitable donation receipts.

#### Note 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### a) Basis of Presentation

The Association prepares its financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

#### b) Use of estimates

When preparing financial statements according to ASNPO, estimates and assumptions are made relating to reported amounts of revenue and expenditure, assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Assumptions are based on a number of factors, including historical experience, current events, actions that the Association may undertake in the future, and other assumptions that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results could differ from those estimates under different conditions and assumptions. Estimates are used when accounting for certain items such as useful lifes of capital assets and impairment of long-lived assets.

#### c) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognized when earned, specifically when all the following conditions are met:

- There is clear evidence that an arrangement exists.
- · Amounts are fixed or can be determined.
- The ability to collect is reasonably assured.

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when they are received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

#### d) Cash and cash equivalents

The Association classifies highly liquid investments with maturity of three months or less from the date of purchase as cash and cash equivalents.

#### e) Contributed services

Volunteers contribute significant hours per year to assist the Association in delivering its services. Because of the difficulty in determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

#### f) Capital assets

The capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided annually at rates and methods over the estimated useful lives as follows, prorated for the number of months of ownership. The estimates of the useful lives of the assets are reviewed every year and adjusted on a prospective basis, if needed.

Impairment of capital assets is reviewed whenever events or changes in the circumstances indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognized for the excess of the carrying value over the fair value of the asset, during the year the impairment occurred.

#### Note 2 FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Association's financial instruments consist of cash, accounts receivable, and accounts payable. Unless otherwise noted, it is the opinion of management that the Association is not exposed to significant interest, currency, or credit risks arising from these financial instruments. The fair value of the instruments approximates their carrying values, unless otherwise noted.

The Association initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities originated or exchanged in arm's length transactions at fair value. Financial assets and financial liabilities originated or exchanged in related party transactions, except for those that involve parties whose sole relationship with the organization is in the capacity of management, are initially measured at cost. The cost of a financial instrument in a related party transaction depends on whether the instrument has repayment terms. The Association subsequently measures all its financial assets and liabilities at cost or amortized cost. Financial assets subsequently measured at amortized cost include cash, term deposits, accounts receivable and prepaid expenses. Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include accounts payable.

#### Note 5 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

#### Note 6 INTERNALLY RESTRICTED RESERVES

Funds have been restricted internally by the Board of Directors to cover the salary of the Executive Director for one year should the position be dissolved. This reserve would allow for the continuation of the duties of this position until they are reallocated to volunteers. The total in this reserve is \$55,000.

Funds have been restricted internally by the Board of Directors for future tournament equipment expenditures. The total in this reserve is \$10,000.

#### **Report of the VP- Administration**

This past year has been a challenging one for me as I tried to balance my many roles and responsibilities with my personal life. I continued my primary work on promoting the sport of archery through numerous BC Archery Try-it clinics in various indigenous communities around the south coast of BC through a partnership with ISPARC (the Indigenous Sports Physical Activity and Recreation Council), as well as other third-party groups like Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Spirit of the children, Girl Guides, Boy Scouts, Pacific Sport and BC Wheel Chair Sports. I continued to sit on or Chair a number of Committees including the Coaching Committee and the Risk Management Committee, and I have added the Club Engagement Committee which is working to help encourage engagement of our members in BC Archery affiliated clubs and to try to find ways to bring more unaffiliated clubs into the fold. Through this new committee I am exploring ways to connect my work on the Club Handbook (which is ready for final publication) with the development of other materials/brochures to help our newer members navigate their gradual participation in more official tournaments. This year I also continued to facilitate coaching clinics and followed up with participants to try to get them to complete their portfolios and get certified. I also continued in the role of Zone Coordinator for the 55+ Games which saw a five fold increase in the participation in our Zone. This year I also took on the role of Head Coach of Team BC's 3D Archery squad at the North American Indigenous Games in Halifax, which involved organizing and facilitating a number of development camps in addition to the week-long event in July. Lastly, I continued to offer my support to the other volunteer directors on their Action Items of the Strategic Plan and our Risk Registry.

#### SOCIETIES ACT (BRITISH COLUMBIA)

#### Persons qualified to be directors

- 44 (1) A person is qualified to be a director of a society only if the person is an individual who is at least 18 years of age.
- (2) Despite subsection (1), an individual who is 16 or 17 years of age is qualified to be a director of a society if provided for in the regulations.
- (3) Despite subsections (1) and (2), an individual is not qualified to be a director of a society if the individual is
  - (a) found by any court, in Canada or elsewhere, to be incapable of managing the individual's own affairs,
  - (b) an undischarged bankrupt, or
  - (c) convicted in or out of British Columbia of an offence in connection with the promotion, formation or management of a corporation or unincorporated entity, or of an offence involving fraud, unless
    - (i) the court orders otherwise,
    - (ii) 5 years have elapsed since the last to occur of
      - (A) the expiration of the period set for suspension of the passing of sentence without a sentence having been passed,
      - (B) the imposition of a fine,
      - (C) the conclusion of the term of any imprisonment, and
      - (D) the conclusion of the term of any probation imposed, or
    - (iii) a pardon was granted or issued, or a record suspension was ordered, under the *Criminal Records Act* (Canada) and the pardon or record suspension, as the case may be, has not been revoked or ceased to have effect.
